



Club History

- The Bristol and Gloucestershire Gliding Club (BGGC) is one of the largest gliding clubs in the UK. It was founded in 1938 and operated from Lulsgate, now the home of Bristol International airport, until relocating to its current site at Nympsfield, Gloucestershire in 1956.
- The club operates from its own 100 acre airfield located on the Cotswold edge overlooking the Severn valley, across to the Black Mountains in Wales and to the Malvern Hills to the north.
- The club has approximately 150 pilot members, 3 two-seat training gliders, 3 single-seat gliders and a tow aircraft. It is also the base for a large number of privately owned gliders and a smaller number of privately owned powered aircraft.

Gliding

- Gliders or sailplanes as they are sometimes called, are aeroplanes without engines. Gliders are far more efficient than powered aircraft. A glider's long wings enable them to fly great distances and soar to great heights using only the natural energy of the sky. Glider pilots learn how to use that energy to gain height and stay airborne
- Gliding is an adventure sport and like most things in life, does involve some level of risk. But with proper training and sensible airmanship the risks are very low.
- Gliding is regulated by the European Aviation Safety Agency (EASA), the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) and the British Gliding Association (BGA). All BGGC flying instructors have to pass a rigorous series of flying assessments to qualify and are subject to regular review to maintain their ratings



Cadet Scheme

- Gliding is a sport that combines adventure, tenacity, and decision making with elements of science, technology, and engineering. Learning to fly a modern glider helps young people develop flexibility, teamwork, tenacity and decision making skills.
- The objective of the cadet scheme is to introduce and encourage young people to the sport of gliding.
- The scheme is open to any young person between the ages of 14 and 18. No formal qualifications are required other than enthusiasm, determination and commitment.
- The Bristol & Gloucestershire Gliding Club at Nympsfield is one of the British Gliding Association's (BGA) accredited Junior Gliding Centre and home to the Bristol University Gliding Club.



Training

- We will train you to a standard required to pilot a glider on your own ('flying solo').
- Initially you will fly with a qualified instructor in a dual-control training aircraft. When you have successfully completed the pre-solo part of the BGA training syllabus and the instructor thinks you are ready, you will be sent solo your first flight on your own.
- Training will also include presentations and tutorials on subjects such as the theory of flight, meteorology and air law, usually when the weather is unsuitable for flying.
- Learning to fly will require regular attendance. You should expect to spend at least one full day each weekend at the club and as often as possible during school holidays.
- You will be provided with a pilot's logbook to record your progress.



Responsibilities

- A senior instructor is responsible for operating the airfield. You will be part of their team, helping to run the gliding operation alongside other cadets and adult members.
 Your duties will include:
- Retrieving gliders using the club retrieve vehicles (needs explicit parental permission)
- Ensuring the daily flying log is accurately maintained.
- Connecting gliders to the tow aircraft and winch launching system.
- Launching gliders using radio communications and winch signal system.
- Helping prepare gliders at the start of flying and packing the hangar at completion.
- Any other aviation related tasks necessary to ensure efficient flying.



Solo and Beyond

- Your first solo flight is a memorable day and one you will never forget, but the learning really starts here.
- Becoming an accomplished pilot is a continuous process and there are many, many more goals to pursue - the BGA bronze badge, the FAI (Fédération Aéronautique Internationale) silver, gold and diamond badges, cross-country flying, racing competitions, aerobatics and much more.
- And once you are 16 or over, you can apply for a European Sailplane Pilot Licence.

Training Costs

- Many people think that flying is expensive, however, when you find out how much gliding costs you might be pleasantly surprised.
- Cadet flying is subsidised and the instruction is free. You will pay for the launch and the flight time. A typical 30-minute training flight from a winch launch costs less than a driving lesson, and the annual cadet membership is half the price of many games consoles.
- Training is available 7 days a week from March to November and on demand during the winter months.
